We have been releasing rehabilitated parrots and other birds onto a 50 acre river-front reserve since 2004. Many of the released birds visit the feeders daily. The location is also safe haven for over 140 species of wild birds.



BBR houses between 150 and 230 birds undergoing medical care, hand-rearing or long-term rehabilitation for release

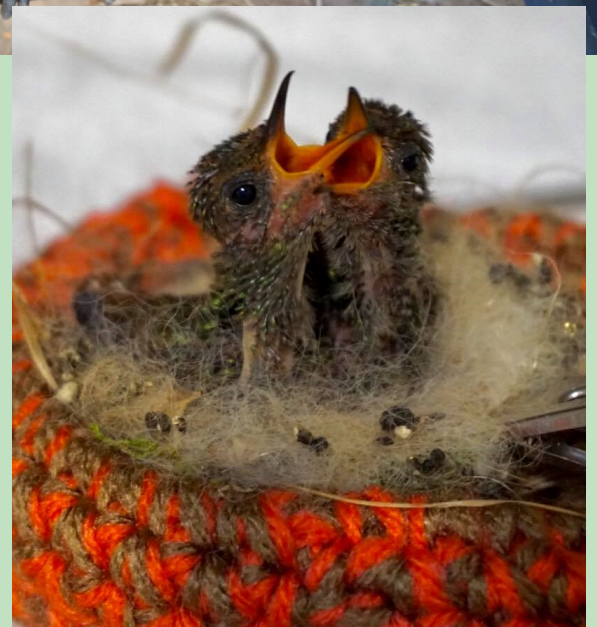

We travel all over the country to carry out rescues, releases, education & outreach and vet visits



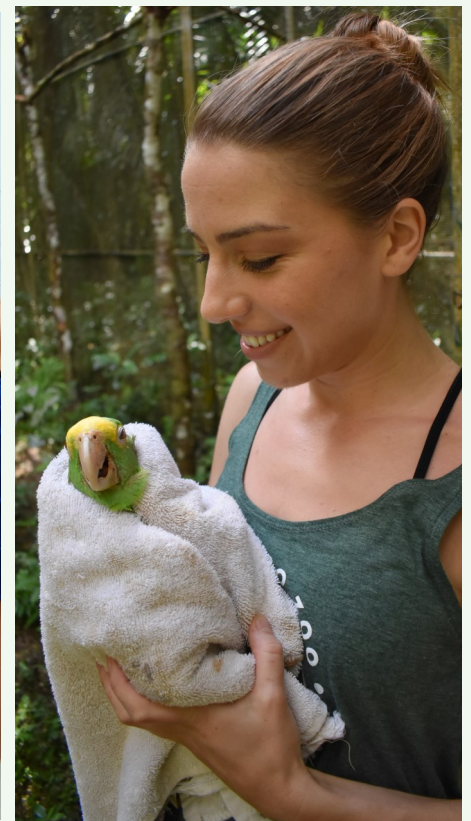

BBR Specialist Projects



Captive Wildlife Permit Programme

A collaborative effort between Belize Forest Department. and BBR, whereby birds already in captivity, in good health and kept under prescribed standards of care, are issued with permits. Unpermitted birds will then be confiscated for rehabilitation, bringing an end to birds entering the illegal trade in future years.

Rehabilitation for release of former-captive parrots

Generally considered impossible to do, BBR has pioneered the methodology and protocols for the rehabilitation for release of former-captive wild birds.

The birds spend years undergoing rehabilitation to repair chronic health issues, imprinting, habituation and vocalisation. During this time the birds develop pair bonds, learn flock integration and basic foraging and predator survival skills.

Since 2004, BBR has released over 1000 former captive parrots back into the wild.



At-risk yellow-headed parrot programme

This programme entails the identification, extraction and hand-rearing for release of endangered yellow-headed Amazon chicks that would otherwise perish in the nest or enter the illegal wildlife trade



Saving the yellow-head

Amazona oratrix belizensis



As of 2023, BBR has returned 186 endangered yellow-headed Amazons to the wild. In an estimated population of 1200-1600 birds, this constitutes more than 10% of the population



Hand-reared chicks are released into National Parks the following season. This project is a close collaboration between Belize Bird Rescue, Belize Bird Conservancy, Toledo Institute for Development and Environment, and the Belize Forest Department. In 2024 we will engage with other stakeholders and expand the project countrywide.

Sanctuary

Not every bird is able to survive in the wild. We provide natural environment sanctuary care for flocks of non-releasable parrots, and give one-on-one attention or provide home-care for our special needs birds.

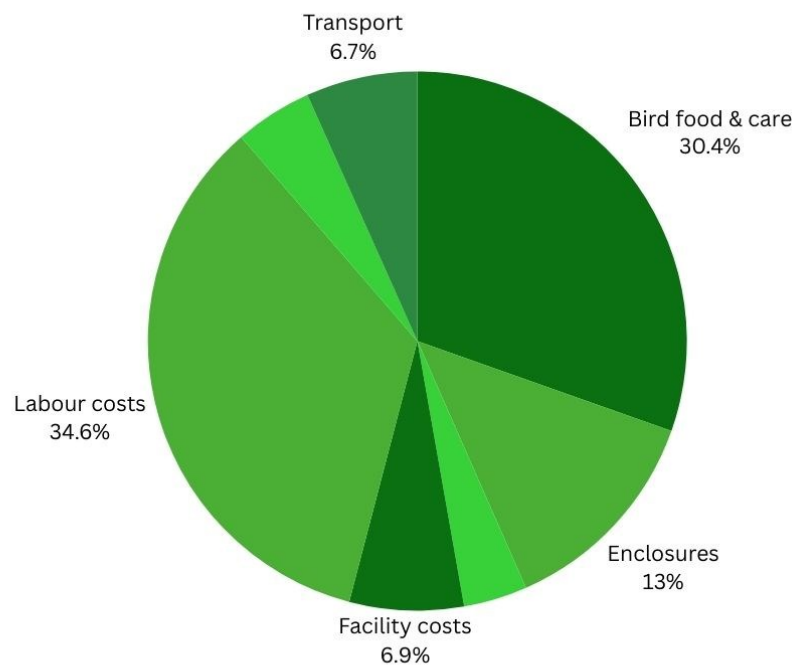

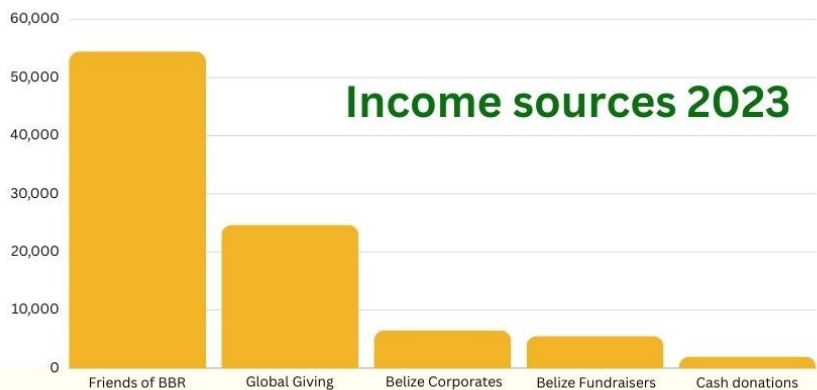
